INTRODUCTION 2.

In order to focus attention on various issues relating to heritage conservation in the region, the MMRDA in its meeting held on 30th May, 1996 approved the proposal to establish the MMR-Heritage Conservation Society. Accordingly, the MMR-Heritage Conservation Society was registered under the Societies Registration Act, 1860 on 14th November, 1996 and the Mumbai Public Trust Act, 1950 on 6th February, 1997.

OBJECTIVES OF THE SOCIETY

The main objectives of the MMR-Heritage Conservation Society are – to promote preservation, conservation, protection, development and improvement of natural, built and related cultural heritage within the area of Mumbai Metropolitan Region (MMR); and to adopt all means to achieve the objects incidental or ancillary to the attainment of the main objects including but not restricted to the following:


a) Developing a Data Base for Mumbai Metropolitan Region:

• To conduct studies/surveys of buildings, artefacts, structures and precincts of historical / aesthetic / architectural / cultural value;

• To undertake systematic listing of heritage buildings and precincts as well as identifying the components of natural / cultural heritage which needs to be conserved;

• To compile and store data on heritage, including digital database conversion by using advanced techniques such as computerized optical image processing;

• To set up a full-fledged resource centre including library, material documentation and photo-documentation centre on heritage conservation.



 To organize training programmes for local authorities for developing capabilities in undertaking heritage conservation related activities;

• To sponsor candidates for participating in training courses in India/ abroad for architectural students and local authority staff in heritage conservation and related subjects;

• To promote awareness about heritage conservation movement by educating general public as well as students at the school level, by organizing exhibitions/competitions on heritage conservation.

The Jurisdiction of the Society is the Mumbai Metropolitan Region (MMR) area. Project proposals are invited in the format prescribed by the Society from Local bodies, University, Colleges, Societies, Institutions, Voluntary Organizations, NGOs and intellectual individuals working in the field of heritage conservation.

b) Training, Education and Awareness:

• To encourage the architectural educational institutions by undertaking training programmes in heritage conservation & carrying out documentation of heritage buildings and precincts in MMR;

•To publish a journal and organize other publications on various aspects related to heritage conservation;

c) Providing Financial Assistance to Conservation:

• To finance the programmes for maintenance of heritage buildings/

• To finance the programmes leading to preservation and conservation of natural heritage such as coastal areas, lakes, rivers, forests, hills and

• To finance the programmes of preservation and conservation of settlements of cultural and historical significance;

• To promote networking of various agencies in MMR including local historical societies, NGO's and professionals.

4. OVERVIEW OF SOCIETY'S ACTIVITIES

During the last 20 years, the MMR-Heritage Conservation Society has supported **71** projects, involving survey, documentation, guidelines for major heritage buildings and precincts and implementation of actual conservation/ restoration of heritage structures and the grant approved for these projects was **Rs. 7.45 crores.** Some of the important projects completed are:

1. Heritage Listing: Guidelines for heritage buildings in Thane, Kalyan, Matheran and Navi Mumbai Notified area; Comprehensive Listing and Grading of Heritage Structures and Precincts in Greater Mumbai; Documentation and Conservation Guidelines for Heritage Buildings and Precincts in Vasai-Virar Sub-Region; Listing and Conservation Plan for Fountains and Pyaavs in the City of Mumbai; Listing and Grading of heritage buildings and precincts in Urban and Rural areas of Thane and Raigad districts in MMR.

2. Precinct Studies: Study and Conservation guidelines for Dadar Parsi colony and Khodadad Circle Precincts; Khotachiwadi Precinct; Ballard Pier Precinct; Matheran precinct; Bandra Precinct; Opera House Precinct; Marine Drive Precinct; Cumballa Hill Precinct; Mahatar Pakhadi Precinct; Mahalakshmi Temple precinct; Shivaji park Heritage Precinct, Preparation of Action plan for Conservation of Erangal village Precinct; Chembur Precinct; Deulwadi Precinct; Agashi Talao Precinct.

3. Conservation and Implementation: Conservation of Ballard Bunder Gate house and Bombay Castle wall located at Naval Dockyard, Convocation Hall of Mumbai University, Meeting Hall of Matheran Hill Station Municipal Council, Wilson College, David Sassoon Library, Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Vastu Sangrahalaya (CSMVS), refurbishment of BJPC Institution and upgradation work at the Durbar Hall of Asiatic Society.

4. Research: Revitalization and management plan for the forts within MMR, Preparation of Nomination for Victorian & Art Deco Ensemble of Mumbai as a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

5. Outreach and Awareness: Society has also funded meetings/Seminars/Conferences about preventive maintenance of Buildings to avoid collapses; Re-visioning Mumbai by the Asiatic Society of Mumbai; Seminar on Architecture as Social History: Reflections on Bombay/Mumbai; International conference of Commonwealth Association of Museums titled "Rethinking of Mumbai"; Kalighat Paintings Exhibition; Financial assistance for hosting 22nd Art History Congress and documentaries on Heritage Awareness of Caves in MMR; A Legend almost forgotten; Mumbai Music: Listening to the Modern City.

The Society has so far released financial assistance of Rs. 6.49 crores for the projects up to 31/03/2017.

5. ACTIVITIES DURING THE YEAR 2016-17

5.1 NEW PROJECT PROPOSALS

During the year 2016-17, the Society received eleven project proposals for funding, which were scrutinized by the Sub-Committee of the Society. Four proposals are under consideration, on the recommendation of the Sub-Committee, the Board of Governors rejected six proposals; and approved the following one project proposal for funding:

(a) "Migration of hosting and maintenance of website of MMR-HCS from C-DAC, Pune" Convergence IT Services

C-DAC, Pune was awarded the project for the initial hosting charges of Rs. 5 Lakh plus taxes for the subsequent year and hosting and maintenance cost of Rs. 2.5 Lakh plus taxes as applicable for the subsequent five years.

The C-DAC, Pune had developed the MMR-HCS website and the five years contract for hosting and maintenance awarded to C-DAC expired in March 2016. C-DAC requested the release of final installation and also sent a new quotation amounting to Rs. 3 Lakh per year plus taxes as applicable for hosting and maintenance of website. As the fees for hosting and maintenance of website quoted by C-DAC Pune was found expensive, the said work was awarded to Convergence IT Services Pvt. Ltd., Mumbai in July 2016, after inviting quotations.

In the meeting of the Board of Governors, held on 24th March 2017, the project consultant presented the website live. Thereafter, the Board of Governors approved the conclusion of the project. C-DAC had sent all the backup data of MMR-HCS website and Heritage Information System, duly organized in five DVD's and the last installment of the project was released.

5.2 **ON-GOING PROJECTS**

The Board of Governors / Sub-Committee of the Society reviewed the progress reports of the following on-going projects:

(a) "Forgotten Gods and Deserted Strongholds – A Case Study of Europeans/Colonial Archaeology in the districts of Thane, Mumbai and Mumbai Suburban Districts with a part of Raigad District, especially Uran Shri. Mayur Thakare and Alibaug Talukas (1498-1818)"

The proponent proposes to document the archaeological sites pertaining to document Indo-European sites, all Portuguese and British sites in the category of Defensive/Religious/Civil in the districts of thane, Mumbai Sub-Urban and Raigad, falling in the time bracket of 1498-1818 AD, to document important sites/monuments pertaining to regional power too, which had witnessed significant events during their relations with Portuguese and British.


A total of 105 sites were identified. The proponent has submitted a report with documentation of 55 of these rare and previously undocumented sites. The typology of sites documented includes Portuguese watch towers, outposts, step-wells, church complexes, fortified mansions, bastions- circular, square, pentagonal, fragments of fort walls, fortress etc. Since, they have not been identified so far, they are in neglected and dilapidated condition and require immediate attention.

Documentation is ongoing for the remaining 50 sites. Considering the time and effort put in by the proponent and the pioneer work of identification of these rare sites, the Sub-Committee has approved an additional payment of Rs. 1,75,000/-, which is to released on submission of final report comprising a documentation of 105 sites. A total amount of Rs. 2,40,000/- has been released till 31st March 2017. Final report is awaited.



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Developing Heritage Circuit Maps in the MMR


The objective of this task is to identify and delineate five heritage routes across MMR from within the existing list of Heritage Buildings and Precincts, along with preparation of A1 size foldout circuit maps, printed on both sides with drawings, photographs and descriptions of sites etc. The documentation has to include various related aspects of the routes like transport, history, important features, infrastructure, important aspects related to heritage, complementary cultural heritage aspects (food, music etc) and

Task 1: Envirodesigners Pvt. Ltd.

Heritage circuit maps have been prepared for five sites - 1) Matheran Hill Circuit 2) Ulhas River & Archaeological Sites Circuit 3) Alibaug and Pen Town 4) Fort Precinct of Mumbai 5) C – Ward of Mumbai. The final maps were reviewed by the Board of Governors and the work was found satisfactory. The final maps are to be printed for dissemination. A total amount of Rs. 5,35,315 (including service tax) has been released.


Task 2: Rachana Sansad's Urban Design Cell

Five draft heritage circuit maps were prepared for -1) Western Suburbs 2) Island City E-Ward 3) Vasai Virar Sub Region 4) Thane City 5) Kalyan City, and were reviewed by the Sub-Committee. A final review of the maps is pending after the consultant incorporates comments suggested by the Sub-Committee. The project can be concluded, if the Sub-Committee finds the maps executed to their satisfaction and the maps can be printed for dissemination. A total amount of Rs. 5,09,080 (including service tax) has been released.









2. Developing a Synoptic Document of Heritage in the MMR from the existing studies: Adarkar Associates

The objective of the task is develop a synoptic document from all the previous studies of identification and listing of heritage sites in the various parts of MMR towards: a) A comprehensive understanding of heritage sites in the MMR

b) Developing a history of the region through its built form

Over the course of the year, the consultant presented the final list of 255 heritage sites across MMR, to be included in the book, along with the progress of the work to the Sub-Committee such as, final chapterization of the synoptic document, bare texts of all the chapters, draft of the first formatted chapter and fresh photographs taken towards first four chapters. As authorized by the Board of Governors, an additional fund of Rs. 4 lakhs, requested by the consultant was approved by the Sub-Committee, considering the scope of work has increased over time and the extra effort put in by the consultant on the project.

A total amount of Rs. 9,09,896 (including service tax) has been released. The Sub-Committee has also approved the release of Rs. 3 Lakhs out of Rs. 4 Lakhs, subject to receipt of the final draft of the synoptic document by the consultant. The final draft of the manuscript is awaited.



Based on the Sub-Committee's observations and comments, the consultant is reworking both the content and graphic design of the book. A total amount of Rs. 7,22,528/- has been released. 

The objective of this project is to develop a manuscript of compilations of minimum 20 case studies in Heritage Conservation in MMR.











(c) "Documentation of Caves in MMR"

Sathaye College, Mumbai

Date of Approval: March, 2015 Grant: Rs

MMR region has around 200 Caves, a few of which are recently dicovered and have not been documented. Existing studies are often not comprehensive and a holistic approach to documentation is missing. The project proposes to document the newly discovered caves and related sites by making plans, sections and elevations for study and for better understanding of its architecture.

The proponent will compile scattered information systematically with a holistic approach and even study the cultural context as reflected through the archaeological sources, monuments and oral traditions whilst providing analytical notes. The publication will benefit not only the common man but it also will benefit scholars working in the field of archaeology, art history, epigraphy, iconography etc.

In the first stage of the project, published data was collected and preliminary survey of these caves was conducted. Out of these caves, few caves were selected for documentation, as the data in the form of painting in the caves is about to get destroyed. The cave sites of Jogeshwari and Mandapeshwar were selected as pilot sites for the methodology of documentation and the report format to be followed. The proponent has submitted preliminary reports on these sites. The reports are a compilation of published data about art and architecture, inscriptions, historical and archaeological background from various books and compilation of data from ASI, Mumbai Circle. The reports were reviewed and observed to be exemplary and could serve as an ideal form of document to be followed, if undertaken by the Society in future by other agencies.

A total amount of Rs. 3,88,244/- has been released so far. Second stage progress report is awaited.

(d) "Research on Theatrical backdrops, 1905-1960: A succinct survey"

Niteeka Archival Research Infotech Pvt. Ltd.



The main objective of this project is to identify, research and analyze the art involved in Marathi theatrical backdrops; to enumerate the various artists involved with production of theatrical backdrops and finally to formulate a coffee-table book for publication. The subject matter of the project has not been studied in detail earlier. The artists and the art of creating theatrical backdrops have not been brought in the public domain. Due to the onset of modernity in drama and its practices, the backdrops dimensions dissolved- rendering the art and artistry to oblivion.

The proponent has submitted chapterization of the report and first stage report comprising a chapter on the "Drama at the turn of the 20th Century", against which second installment of the project has been released. The Second stage progress report is awaited. A total amount of 1 Lakhs has been released upto 31/03/2017.

(e) "Development of Heritage Information System for MMR- HCS"

The Society had proposed to undertake a project of developing Heritage Information System for MMR, with an intention of compiling the researched and available information with the Society and putting it in the public domain. The final output will be a map-based Heritage Information System. The first installment for the project has been released and the project is in process.

The website was successfully migrated with a user friendly and mobile friendly webpage. New features have been added like recording user count and a better search option to include 'pdf' format.

5.3 CONCLUDED PROJECTS

In addition to above new and on-going projects, the Board of Governors/Sub-Committee of the Society also reviewed the final report of the following project:

(b) "Development of software on Heritage Information System for MMR" C-DAC, Pune

The Board of Governors, in its meeting held on 22nd December 2008, apporved the above project with a cost of Rs. 21.5 lakh plus taxes as applicable. The scope of project included creation of a web-based information system for the MMR-HCS, which will comprise detailed information about MMR-HCS, help the society to host the website and maintain it and train the staff of the society to update the website.

C-DAC, Pune was awarded the project for the initial hosting charges of Rs. 5 Lakh plus taxes for the subsequent year and hosting and maintenance cost of Rs. 2.5 Lakh plus taxes as applicable for the subsequent five years. The C-DAC, Pune had developed the MMR-HCS website and the five years contract for hosting and maintenance awarded to C-DAC expired in March 2016. C-DAC requested the release of final installation and also sent a new quotation amounting to Rs. 3 Lakh per year plus taxes as applicable for hosting and maintenance of website. As the fees for hosting and maintenance of website quoted by C-DAC Pune was found expensive, the said work was awarded to Convergence IT Services Pvt. Ltd., Mumbai in July 2016, after inviting quotations.

Therefore the conclusion of the project 'Development of software on Heritage Information System for MMR'- by C-DAC, was approved by the Board of Governors. C-DAC had sent all the backup data of MMR-HCS website and Heritage Information System, duly organized in five DVD's and the last installment of the project was released.

(b) "Upgradation work at the Durbar Hall of Asiatic Society of Mumbai (Installation of Lift)" The Asiatic Society of Mumbai

The Board of Governors, in its meeting held on 22nd September 2015, suggested that the Society should now focus on actual conservation/restoration for new projects. In accordance with this view, a request made to the President of the Society, by the President of Asiatic society of Mumbai, for financial assistance for the restoration works in the Asiatic Society building was considered by the Board of Governors of the Society.

As per the guidelines of the Society for financing projects, it was decided to provide a financial assistance only for installation of Hydraulic lift, as it is critical retrofitting intervention to make the heritage building navigable for the elderly and the disabled. Accordingly, the Sub-Committee recommended financial assistance of Rs. 11.91 Lakhs, i.e. 50% of the estimated expenditure for installation of lift, as per the financial regulations of the MMR-HCS.

After completion of the project, the final detailed report was submitted to the Society and the last installment of the project was released. The Asiatic Society of Mumbai requested grant of additional financial assistance, as there was an additional expense of Rs. 5,22,796/- incurred due to construction of a raised platform for electrical equipment of the lift and purchase of backup battery. An additional amount of Rs. 2.62 Lakhs or 50% of the additional cost, whichever is less, was approved by the Board of Governors.

The Sub-Committee perused the statement of expenditure and approved the release of additional financial assistance of Rs. 2.61 lakhs for the project.









6 TRAINING AND AWARENESS PROGRAMMES

"Capacity Development Programme in Built Heritage Studies & Conservation"

The Board of Governors in its meeting held on 22nd March 2011 suggested that a training programme on capacity building needs to be developed for various stakeholders involved with heritage conservation. Accordingly, the Society's office prepared the proposal and the Sub-Committee of the Society discussed the various aspects of the training programme in meetings between March 2011 and July 2013. It was decided to create a year-long diploma course on 'Built Heritage Studies and Conservation', which would be conducted through week long modules specifically targeting various stakeholders involved in the conservation process. It was also felt that it was necessary to collaborate with the Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Vastu Sangrahalaya (CSMVS) for their expertise in training on various aspects of conservation and Sir J.J College of Architecture (JJCOA) for their academic expertise.

The Society decided to support the course for a period of 5 years with a budget of Rs 1 crore. The Board of Governors approved the proposal of the training programme and the budget of Rs. 20 Lakh for one year. The programme was inaugurated in August 2013. The 4th Capacity Development Programme for the year 2016-17 was successfully concluded in February 2017. The different courses covered during the year 2016-17 are as mentioned in table.






